The Meaning of Bar Mitzvah

Jewish children become bar/bat mitzvah (literally, children of commandment) at age 13, when they take on the responsibilities and privileges of membership in the Jewish community. Since the 14th century, this transition to adulthood for Jewish boys has been marked by a ceremony in which the boy is called to read from the Torah. Reconstructionist Judaism was the first branch of Judaism to extend this tradition to girls, beginning in 1922.

Adat Shalom ~ Our Synagogue

Adat Shalom Reconstructionist Congregation was founded in 1987. The name means "Community of Peace." Many of the design elements of the synagogue relate to themes in Jewish history. The pillars and pools at the building's entrance recall King Solomon's temple. The wooden vaulting in the sanctuary are suggestive of the synagogues of Eastern Europe. The tented ceiling wraps the entire congregation in a tallit (Jewish prayer shawl).

Reconstructionist Judaism

Reconstructionist Judaism, founded in the early 20th century by Rabbi Mordecai Kaplan, views Judaism as an "evolving, religious, civilization" where "tradition has a voice, but not a veto." Reconstructionist communities share and create *new ways of being Jewish* to *connect us to the divine* and ensure our lives *are filled with purpose*. This uniquely American movement of Judaism holds these basic beliefs about our Jewish civilization: Judaism changes throughout history; We hold diverse ideas about God, but we share an emphasis on godliness; Jews are not a 'chosen people' (we affirm the uniqueness of the Jewish people and its heritage among the peoples of the world; this implies no sense of superiority); Judaism should be inclusive and egalitarian; The driving force behind Judaism is belonging rather than believing (i.e., the primary way of expressing oneself as a Jew is to see oneself as a member of the Jewish people); Judaism and working for social justice are inseparable; and, The State of Israel is vital to Jewish cultural and spiritual survival.
